The GATS (General Agreement on Trade in Services) is an agreement of the 146 member countries of the WTO. The GATS imposes increasing commercial regulations on the circulation of knowledge, immaterial goods and services. Art is encapsulated within the category "Recreational, cultural and sporting services". In 1995, many countries put their trust in a "cultural exemption", but in 2005 culture is due to be renegotiated. **Art and culture are part of the commons and can't be subsumed into the WTO's agenda.**



In response to the WTO's empire, we recommend **ART.**
